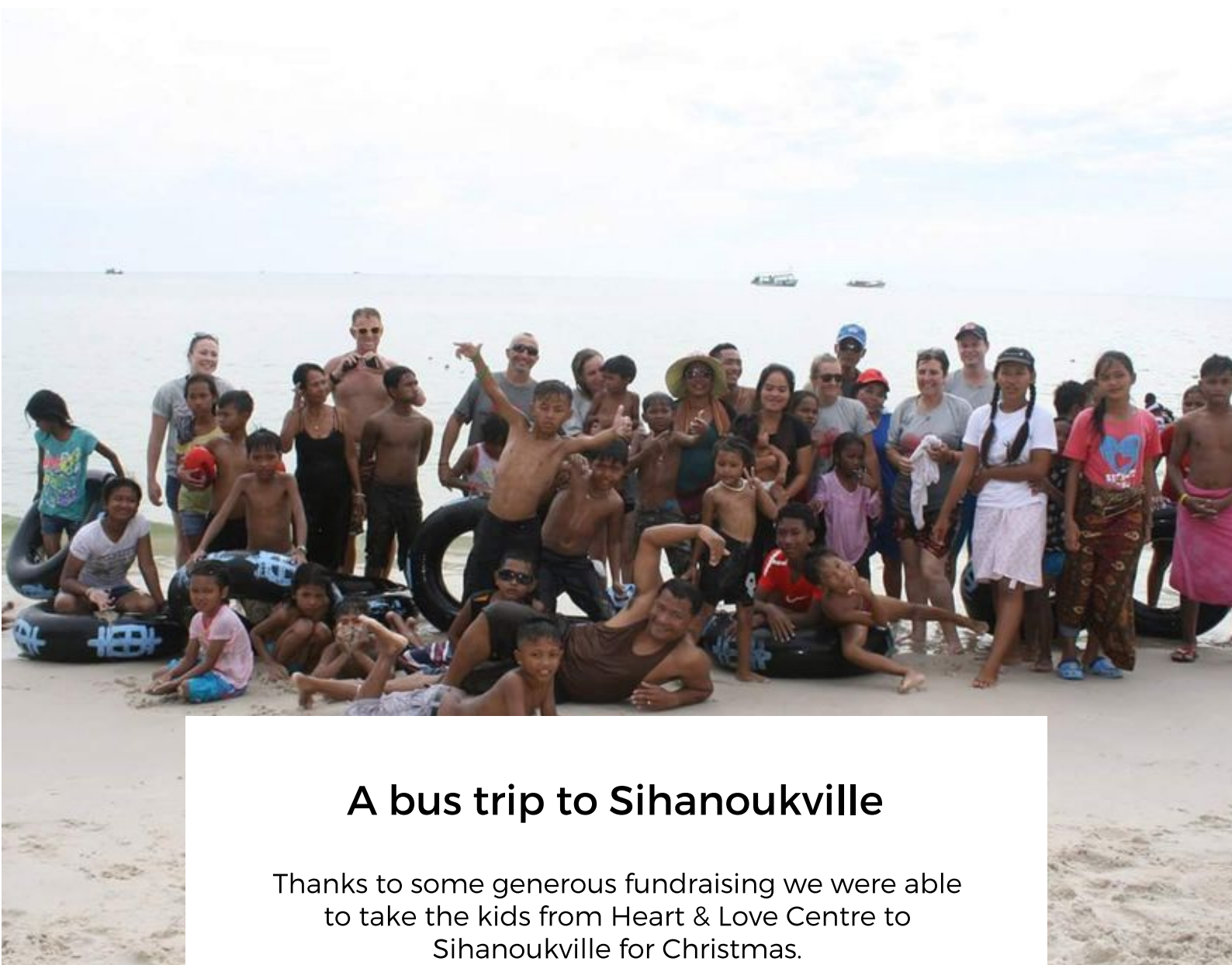


PCYC Partnership

Four of our eight houses built this year were thanks to a new partnership with the Police Citizens Youth Clubs of Nerang and Dalby. They brought 15 teens working on their Duke of Ed Award to participate in the build. The relationship with the clubs looks to grow into the future and we hope more groups will visit us through them. We were also lucky enough to have two other groups of volunteers building houses with the group from Yeppoon in Northern Queensland also providing toilets and a well.

House building groups are a great way for us to provide housing but it also allows our Cambodian staff to work alongside and learn from other cultures, which in turn broadens their exposure to the world outside of Cambodia.
