The increase in volunteers also showed the need to purchase our own transportation and with the help of Paul and Cathy Vrolyks and ADU Tours we were able to purchase a shiny new blue tuk truck to not only transport volunteers but locals alike. The tuk truck also helped with the transportation of our interns to dental hygiene days as well as other activities throughout the year.

Although in numbers it appeared as though community build numbers fell, we have been working on a plan to provide more sanitation in the form of wells and toilets. For every house this year we made sure for those that didn't already have them, they were provided with a toilet and a well. No longer just building houses but providing what the family needs for better hygiene and improving their lives. We were also very proud to join forces with the Ashmore Rotary club who provided the funds to build two new homes.

Our community involvement continued to grow stronger with a community outing to West Baray as well as our Christmas Giving Day. This day held at the community centre, saw many members of the community becoming involved, helping to cook food and support their community.

We are very pleased with the direction Heartprint is heading and with so many sponsors and supporters now on board we know we can build a better life for the Heartprint communities. We hope you will continue to join us and support us as we head into 2018.

Push for Sanitation

Although this year saw a drop in house numbers we worked hard to make sure every family we built for also had or received a toilet and a well.

This decision was formed on the basis that to make an impact on the hygiene conditions families were living in they needed a way to keep their surroundings clean and safe.

Partway through the year our "Slabman", Dave McNulty came on board and we started putting concrete slabs under every house, keeping the area clean but also extending their living areas.

Houses are no longer about just giving a family somewhere to live, we have started working on changing their whole living standard. With the help of the introduction of family contracts back in 2016 it's seen a vast improvement in the cleanliness of homes as well as school attendance.

This year saw many of our regular volunteers back again to build more houses and some new supporters come on board. We also had the pleasure of joining forces with the Ashmore Rotary club in building two houses with their current president Kevin Moran.



DENTAL HYGIENE

This year we invited our first ever interns to work at Heartprint. With the help of Kindredhouse our sister charity in the USA, six Public Health students from Brigham Young University in Utah came to live with us for six weeks.

This along with sponsorship from Ultradent allowed us to kick off our Dental Hygiene program. Over three days children from the surrounding villages of Heartprint House, as well as the Hun Sen Roluos Primary and High Schools, received an education session on hand and oral hygiene as well as a fluoride treatment applied to their teeth.

We intend to continue this program every year, with the aim of increase the overall health of the children.





WEST BARAY COMMUNITY DAY

With the purchase of a new tuk truck thanks to Paul and Cathy Vrolyks and ADU Tours, we were able to take families from our community out to West Baray for a day of swimming, relaxing, and eating.

Most Khmer families don't get to take a day off and enjoy family time. It was wonderful to see parents playing with their children and everyone enjoying themselves.
